




Paul is the director of a Youth Center in Adigrat, in northern Ethiopia.

Since 1868, "with the People"

The Society of the Missionaries of Africa (nicknamed "the White Fathers") was founded in Algeria, in 1868 by Charles Lavigerie (1825-1892), Archbishop of Algiers, later on Archbishop of Carthage and Primate of Africa, and made Cardinal of the Church. The Society's Mission: To live the Spirit of Jesus and give witness to the Gospel in the African World. "Nicknamed the White Fathers?" Why? Lavigerie gave those young men entering the new Society of Missionaries some simple rules:

1. You will **dress yourself as the people**. From its very beginning, this new missionary group took the Algerian dress of the time, made of natural wool in the winter and of white cotton in the summer: the gandoura (tunic), the burnouse (a cape, a blanket) and the turban over a felt chechia (a red bonnet) with, as a religious sign, a rosary carried around the neck, in the style of the Muslim beads.

2. You will speak the **language of the people**. In Algeria, 150 years ago, the languages used by the people were Arabic and Kabyle. Later on, the Missionaries learned the languages of the peoples they were sent to, Luganda, Kiswahili, Kinyarwanda, Kirundi, Cinyanja, Cibemba, Dyula, Bambara, Hausa... "Speaking the language" became a MAfr hallmark.

3. You will eat the **food of the people**. (No choice! So far away from their homeland, in the 19th Century!)

4. The "**Rule of Three**". Minimum of three in each team. It is as a community that you will live and give witness to the Gospel following the spirituality of Saint Ignatius of Loyola. No lone rangers!

5. Your teams will be international. From its foundation on, the Society had members from Europe (France, Belgium, Germany, Netherlands, Italy, Switzerland, Great Britain, Ireland, Poland, ...), from Africa (Algeria, Uganda, ... and now from 17 African countries), from the Americas (Canada, United States, later on Mexico and Brazil) and new members are joining from Asia (Philippines, India...).

“Bright hope” for the Youth of Adigrat, Ethiopia

Bruh Tesfa is a youth and social center based in Adigrat, in Tigray, northern Ethiopia. Operated by the Missionaries of Africa with the support of the Catholic Diocese of Adigrat, we are a **multi-faith center**. Our activities: Tutorials in English, French and Maths. Computer classes. Resources and space to study in our library. Sports and martial arts. Music, drama and art clubs. We run two hostels, for boys and for girls, up to 30 students coming from remote villages scattered in the mountains. We support the hostel students (from Grade 12 into university).

In Tigrinya, the local language, **Bruh Tesfa** means ‘bright hope’. We aim to be exactly that to the young people in our area. We support them as they try to achieve their potential in difficult circumstances. We try to transform not only their lives but also the lives of their families and communities. We work hand in hand with the predominantly Orthodox Christian population, local religious leaders and civil and education authorities.

We strongly believe that **it is education that will empower the most disadvantaged members** of our society to combat the ignorance and poverty that binds them. We believe that by removing as many as possible of the obstacles to education, **especially amongst girls**, we will be able to uplift this generation and future ones out of poverty.



on a Project realized in Nigeria**

“Drinking water for rural people ”

“Our diocese was created some 10 years ago. It is a rural diocese with most people engaged in peasant farming. Only a few have well paid white collar jobs and this explain how much we are limited, as a Church, to undertake projects like this one. Our rural area has yet to become a Parish. It is a farming area with its population living without the basic amenities like water and light. However, the most needed is water which indeed sustains life of both humans and animals. When people drink from the streams around them, they often suffer from diseases therein. And mainly the women have to walk far distances to access water. Only a few have white collar jobs and salaries. With the money received from the Missionaries of Africa Development Office, we were able to dig a well, install pipes and a manual pump. Still in project, a catchment reservoir.”
